Aims and Objects.

- OP (B) OO -

- 1. To uphold the Sacredness of the Body and the Duty of Health; to inculcate a lofty view of the responsibilities of maternity and the duty of every mother to fit herself for the perfect fulfilment of the natural calls of motherhood, both before and after child-birth, and especially to advocate and promote the Breast-feeding of infants.
- 2. To acquire accurate information and knowledge on matters affecting the Health of Women and Children, and to disseminate such knowledge through the agency of its members, nurses, and others, by means of the natural handing-on from one recipient or beneficiary to another, and the use of such agencies as periodical meetings at members' houses or elsewhere, demonstrations, lectures, correspondence, newspaper articles, pamphlets, books, etc.
- 3. To train specially and to employ qualified Nurses, to be called Plunket Nurses, whose duty it will be to give sound, reliable instruction, advice, and assistance, gratis, to any member of the community desiring such services, on matters affecting the health and well-being of women, especially during pregnancy and while nursing infants, and on matters affecting the health and well-being of their children; and also to endeavour to educate and help parents and others in a practical way in domestic hygiene in general—all these things being done with a view to conserving the health and strength of the rising generation, and rendering both mother and offspring hardy, healthy, and resistive to disease.
- 4. To co-operate with any present or future organisations which are working for any of the foregoing or cognate objects.

N.B.—The Society was started as a League for mutual helpfulness and mutual education, with a full recognition of the fact that, so far as motherhood and babyhood were concerned, there was as much need for practical reform and "going to school" on the part of the cultured and well-to-do as there was on the part of the so-called "poor and ignorant."

Fourteenth Annual Report, 1933-34.

TO THE MEMBERS:

Ladies and Gentlemen.-

It is with pleasure that your Council submits its Fourteenth Annual Report, showing that the work of the Society is being strongly maintained in all its spheres despite the handicap of rather limited funds. Your Council earnestly hopes that someone, when reading this report, will realise the valuable service being given the country and come forward with such financial help as will place the funds in better order. The Council's greatest need is regular income, such as comes from annual subscriptions and interest from Endowments. In the hope of obtaining assistance in these directions special efforts will be made by your Council during the current year.

The Thirteenth Annual Meeting of the Society was held at the Hotel Windsor, on Thursday, 31st August, 1933, the Acting-President, the Hon. J. Hume-Cook, presiding. The speakers were the Premier, Sir Stanley Argyle, Dr. John Dale, and Dr. Vera Scantlebury.

The minutes of the Twelfth Annual Meeting were read and confirmed.

The Report and Accounts for the year ended 30th June, 1933, were adopted.

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PROPAGANDA.

As in previous years, the Royal Show was used as a medium for getting into touch with country mothers and others. The Society has its own stand, where demonstrations were given on mothercraft details, such as the correct way to make up a baby's cot, how to place the baby so as to ensure sound sleep; how baby should be clothed; how milk should be cared for in the home; the care of a premature babe, and so on. Those in charge of this particular branch of the work look on the Show as a golden opportunity in which to extend a knowledge of the Society's health principles. Pamphlets also were distributed to this end.

Through its Infant Welfare and the Primrose Baby Nurses, who are scattered throughout the country as private nurses, or working in institutions or Bush Nursing Centres and others, mothers are being educated in mothercraft on right lines and so are enabled to fulfil their responsibilities to their children, by caring for them as nature intended.

At the Hospital, individual mothers have been instructed in the principles laid down by Sir Truby King. Parties of visitors have also had matters of interest demonstrated to them.

Lectures have been given to Church Guilds, Mothers' Clubs, Friendly Societies and other organisations.

The School Nurse has acted as judge at a number of Baby Shows. These give opportunities to impress on the mothers and others interested the advantages gained from the natural feeding of infants.

SCHOOL WORK.

Under Sister Wilson, class instruction in Mothercraft to School Girls has been ably carried out. As is now generally known, the Society's work is mainly educative in character, and Mothercraft is a subject which must be studied as well as applied, although we still have many in our midst who consider the "maternal instinct," so called, is all that is necessary in a woman to qualify her for the highest position she may be called upon to fill, that of Complete Motherhood.

To this end, the Society has concentrated on the potential mother—the present day school girl, knowing that in her hands lies largely the future of the race, its fitness or otherwise. To her will be given the privilege of rearing, through knowledge, healthy, happy children, with minds reflecting this health and happiness.

Two hundred and twenty-nine (229) school girls presented themselves for examination. Of this number, 182 proved themselves to be up to the required standard, and were awarded the Society's School Girls' Certificate for Mothercraft. The standard throughout was good, in some schools excellent.

From the two foregoing tables it will be seen that from 1st July, 1933, to 30th June, 1934, the total number of deaths among babies attending the various Centres numbered 11, and that out of 123 cases of diarrhoea reported, not one death occurred from this cause amongst the babies attending our Centres.

THE SOCIETY AND ITS TRAINING SCHOOL.

The first Society for the Health of Women and Children, from which has sprung the present day activities in Infant Welfare throughout not only New Zealand and Australia, but the whole world, was formed in Dunedin (N.Z.) in the year 1907, at the instigation of Dr., now Sir, Truby King.

Diarrhoea was rife at the time, not only amongst human babies, but also calves. The reason for this state of affairs was due to the fact that infants were being deprived of their natural food and improper substitutes given, and that the milk derived from the cow was being given to human infants whilst the poor unfortunate calf was proffered his indifferent fare from a bucket, as a rule, far from clean. The result in both cases was disastrous, the young dying like flies.

On the other hand, it was recognised that there will always be a certain percentage of babies to be artificially fed, so the first thing to be done was to find a substitute approaching as nearly as possible to mother's milk. After research, a suitable food was found for infants in the form of cow's milk modified; this was given in those cases only where artificial food was indicated and natural milk not available. But not only was it a question of fcod, but cleanliness, fresh air, sunshine, exercise and other essentials to the welfare of the body, had to be put into practice as well, the result being that from the commencement there was a marked decrease in the infantile death rate, which has continued to this day. As a fact, New Zealand has held for years the honoured position of the lowest infantile mortality rate of any country. So much for New Zealand.

Unfortunately, Australia was, at this time, lagging behind. During the war period alone, Australia lost nearly 50,000 babies. Men and women, with the love of their country at heart, began to ask "why this wastage?" Meetings were held to discuss the best methods of coping with this dreadful state of affairs.

In 1920 the Society for the Health of Women and Children of Victoria (Plunket or Truby King System) came into existence, drew up its Constitution and Rules. Its chief object, the saving of the lives of little ones, its basis educational.

As it was agreed that only nurses specially trained in the art of Infant Welfare would be eligible to teach in our Centres, and New Zealand being so far distant, the Society next concentrated on the opening of a Training School (Plunket System). After many disappointments, a public-spirited friend in the person of Mr. J. T. Tweddle, and the Footscray Municipal Council, made the building and the land of the training school possible. But when the building was complete, there was neither money to furnish nor funds to staff the institution, and so it lay idle for some considerable time. Eventually, our obstacles were overcome, and the Hospital and Training School was publicly opened by the Countess of Stradbroke in March, 1924. It was the first Victorian Training School for Infant Welfare Nurses. This was just ten years ago. During this time, 185 nurses have been trained in Infant Welfare and Mothercraft.

The institution is primarily a training school, and secondly a Hospital for mothers and babies. The type of baby for whom the institution is intended is the one in its first year of life who, for the time being, is failing to thrive satisfactorily, and may be suffering from some form of malnutrition or indigestion. The Hospital is also for those requiring special care and attention, such as a weakling or premature baby.

Mothers with an inadequate supply of breast milk are admitted, for restoration, and those with an overabundance, for regulation purposes.

More particularly are we concerned with the young mothers, whose inexperience is liable to lead her into many pitfalls. By instructing her in mothercraft and right methods generally she gains confidence and is able to nourish her baby as nature intended, when otherwise the probabilities are that baby would be deprived of its natural food and suffer from some disorder due to faulty handling and wrong methods of feeding.

Then there is the general educational work of the Hospital, full information being given to all visitors on the aims of the institution and the methods of Sir Truby King, which are carried out in detail, the success of the same being demonstrated by records and charts.


The Hospital also trains the Mothercraft and Baby Nurse, now widely known and recognised as "Primrose Baby Nurses." These Nurses undergo a practical and theoretical course extending over a period of twelve months. When finished, they are competent to take charge of babies such as are admitted to the Hospital for dietetic treatment, as well as the normal baby. The Primrose Baby Nurse is a boon to young mothers, a large number being engaged to accompany such from the Nursing Home when the mother returns to resume her ordinary life. In this way they are able to instruct the young mother in mothercraft details and right methods, and by so doing give her that confidence which is so essential to the well-being of her baby.

Type of Case Admitted.

The following picture illustrates the type of case admitted to Tweddle.

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TWEDDLE HOSPITAL FOR BABIES.

From 1st July, 1933, to 30th June, 1934, 70 babies and 25 mothers were admitted, making a total of 95, these, with the addition of 7 babies and one mother carried over from the previous year, making a total of 77 babies and 26 mothers (103), resident in the Hospital and under treatment for varying periods. The average length of stay has been 27.7 days for babies and 12.1 days for mothers.

Of the 77 babies under treatment, two died, so giving an infant mortality rate of 2.6.

STUDENTS.

During the year nine nurses have taken the course of training in Infant Welfare. These presented themselves for and passed the prescribed examinations, so gaining the Society's Certificate of Competency in Mothercraft and Infant Welfare. Their names are as follows:—

The following have completed a twelve month's course of training and passed the prescribed examinations entitling them to the Primrose Baby Nurse Certificate:—Jessie Henderson, Thelma Douglas, Queenie North, Ursula O'Sullivan, Patricia Cane, Mollie Waddell, Mary McKenzie, Helen Clements and Monica Lehane.

In addition to these, students to the number of 229 were examined in Mothercraft. 182 of these gained the School Girls' Certificate in this subject, as issued by the Society.

CORRESPONDENCE.

This feature still plays an important part in the work of the Hospital. Country mothers and others unable to attend Centres have been advised on matters concerning their own health as well as the baby's, and pamphlets dealing with the essentials for health have been sent them.

VISITORS.

There has been a large number of interested visitors. To these, information has been given on the aims of the institution, and the methods of Sir Truby King, which are carried out in detail. Special interest was shown by those engaged in Infant Welfare work in other States and overseas.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.

The Hopsital is greatly indebted to the various Auxiliaries, and the management desires to place on record its appreciation of the generous help given.

To the Central Auxiliary thanks are due, not only for its generous gifts throughout the year, but also for its handsome gift of linen to the institution, the proceeds of an "Afternoon," held at the home of Mrs. I. T. Tweddle.

The work of the Sewing Committee, which has given so generously of its time to make up baby garments as well as other sewing for the Hospital, has been much appreciated. It has relieved the Staff of this work, which is often very difficult to fit in with other duties. (See Report).

To the members of the Tweddle Hospital Auxiliary, Footscray, the greatest thanks are due for the generous donations of material forwarded from time to time for the making of baby garments, which are used for the babies in residence.

These garments are made on hygienic principles, having neither tapes or constricting bands to hamper freedom of movement. They page eleven

are also used for educational purposes, the advantages of such being pointed out to mothers.

The amount of material supplied was as follows:—Flannel, 114 yards; cotton crepe, 60 yards; towelling, 120 yards; brilliant and sewing cotton, 5 dozen. Added to these, fruit and groceries to the value of £10 were received as a Christmas gift. Also the Hospital greatly benefited through the wonderful response to a "Larder Afternoon," held by this Auxiliary.

Especial thanks are due to the Primrose Nurses' Auxiliary. The work of this body is very much appreciated, showing as it does the interest taken by these students, past and present, in their training school. Altogether, the Hospital benefited to the extent of £116 through their efforts during the year. (See Report).
