# Aims and Objects.

- 1. To uphold the Sacredness of the Body and the Duty of Health; to inculcate a lofty view of the responsibilities of maternity and the duty of every mother to fit herself for the perfect fulfilment of the natural calls of motherhood, both before and after child-birth, and especially to advocate and promote the Breast-feeding of infants.
- 2. To acquire accurate information and knowledge on matters affecting the Health of Women and Children, and to disseminate such knowledge through the agency of its members, nurses, and others, by means of the natural handing-on from one recipient or beneficiary to another, and the use of such agencies as periodical meetings at members' houses or elsewhere, demonstrations, lectures, correspondence, newspaper articles, pamphlets, books, etc.
- 3. To train specially and to employ qualified Nurses, to be called Plunket Nurses, whose duty it will be to give sound, reliable instruction, advice, and assistance, gratis, to any member of the community desiring such services, on matters affecting the health and well-being of women, especially during pregnancy and while nursing infants, and on matters affecting the health and well-being of their children; and also to endeavour to educate and help parents and others in a practical way in domestic hygiene in general—all these things being done with a view to conserving the health and strength of the rising generation, and rendering both mother and offspring hardy, healthy, and resistive to disease.
- 4. To co-operate with any present or future organisations which are working for any of the foregoing or cognate objects,

N.B.—The Society was started as a League for mutual helpfulness and mutual education, with a full recognition of the fact that, so far as motherhood and babyhood were concerned, there was as much need for practical reform and "going to school" on the part of the cultured and well-to-do as there was on the part of the so-called "poor and ignorant."

# King's Honours.

A most fitting event occurred during our twenty-first birthday year. I refer to the honour conferred upon our very worthy President, the Hon. James Hume-Cook, who had bestowed upon him by His Most Gracious Majesty The King: Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George.

As far back as 1917 Miss M. V. Primrose approached Mr. Hume-Cook regarding the establishment of a Society in Victoria for the Health of Women and Children similar to that founded by the late Sir Truby King in New Zealand.

With the able assistance of the late Dr. J. W. Springthorpe as President, and himself as Hon. Secretary, our Society grew to take its place among the charitable institutions of Victoria. With the financial backing of Mr. J. T. Tweddle and a grant from the State Government, the Hospital was built in 1921, since when hundreds of babies, mothers, and nurses have passed through its portals.

For 10 years Mr. Hume-Cook was the Hon. Secretary, and for 4 years Hon. Treasurer; then on the death of the late Dr. J. W. Springthorpe he became President, which position he has filled with honour to himself and success to our Institution.


I am sure all our members and supporters join in congratulating and wishing him many more years of health and active association with this Institution.

21st Annual Report

#### TO THE MEMBERS:

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Our 21st Birthday Year has been safely negotiated, and we are happy to say that the actual receipts exceeded the expenditure by £113, but, after allowing for depreciation on the Hospital buildings and equipment, a deficiency is shown of £33/8/4 in the Revenue Account

In order to commemorate our Society's coming of age, we have decided to commence a Building Fund, as in the near future the re-building of a larger and more efficient Hospital will be a necessity.

In this connection the Footscray Auxiliary have the honour of heading the donation list with a cheque for £25, and we commend this effort to our members and supporters, and ask for their assistance.

The Government of Victoria have to be congratulated on their far-seeing policy by increasing the grants to institutions such as ours who have for their objective the care of babies and the training of nurses and mothers. Our grant has been increased by £ 150 per annum.

Mr. J. T. Tweddle presided at the Twentieth Annual Meeting, held at the Hotel Windsor on the 5th September, 1940, the speakers being our President, Hon. J. Hume-Cook, Lady Angliss, Dr. Vera Scantlebury-Brown, and Major-General Coxen.

Report and accounts for 1939-1940 were adopted, and the retiring Committee, as indicated on page one of this report, re-elected.

At the close of the meeting Mr. J. P. Knight, our Hon. Treasurer, entertained those present to afternoon tea.

#### Propaganda.

Sisters have acted as Judges at various Baby Shows during the year, and a number of mothers have attended the lectures and demonstrations given at the Hospital by the Sister Tutor and Plunket Nurses.

## Resignation.

Sister Brighta Joyce was on the Staff from July, 1939, to March, 1941. Sister Joyce proved a capable and efficient organiser and teacher, and her resignation was accepted with regret. Sister Miriam Ohlmeyer was appointed to Sister Joyce's position.

#### Infant Welfare Sisters.

The Centre work continues to be carried out in an enthusiastic manner by the Plunket Sisters.

From the Footscray Centre, Sister Devine reports that no deaths have occurred amongst the babies attending the Centre during the year. The attendance has been particularly good, and the Sisters have assisted Doctor with 1000 babies, and children who were immunised.

Footscray Sisters are hoping to improve conditions by a new Centre at West Footscray.

Sister McKellar reports a decided increase in the numbers attending the Williamstown Centre, and appreciates the gift of "Toddlers' Scales" given by the Younger Set.

# "Invergowrie" Homecraft Hostel Students.

The Homecraft Hostel curriculum includes a series of Mothercraft lectures and demonstrations. These were given by Sister Walker (Sister Tutor, Tweddle Hospital) and Sister Lay.

The final practical examination was held at Tweddle Hospital. Fortx-six students were examined; 42 passed. Successful students gained the hospital certificate for a Mothercraft Course for Schoolgirls.

# Footscray Domestic Arts.

Twenty-five school children were given a course of lectures and demonstrations by Sister Lay.

Final examinations were held at "Tweddle" Hospital. Twenty-five were examined, and twenty gained the Schoolgirl's Certificate of Mothercraft.

#### Dietetic Students.

Two dietetic students from St. Vincent's Hospital were in residence at "Tweddle" Hospital for two weeks to receive instructions in the feeding of infants and older children.

Owing to war-time conditions, Doctors from the following Training Schools—Tandarra, Presbyterian, and Tweddle—formed a Board of Lecturers.

Lectures are given in the City by the Board to the students from the above training schools.

## Acknowledgments.

The three Auxiliaries connected with the Hospital have in their usual way given wholehearted support and loyalty to "Tweddle." ### Tweddle Hospital for Babies.

From 1st July, 1940, to 30th June, 1941, 97 babies and 47 mothers were admitted, making a total of 144. These, with the addition of 8 babies and 3 mothers carried over from the previous year, make a total of 105 babies and 50 mothers (155 total) resident in hospital, and under treatment for varying periods.

The average length of stay has been 29.4 days for babies, and 16.8 for mothers. Of these 105 babies under treatment, 1 died; the infant mortality rate being .95 per cent.

Cases were admitted to hospital from all suburbs of Mel-

bourne and from country districts.

### TO OUR MEMBERS OF THE TRUBY KING LEAGUE.

The Committee has pleasure in submitting a summary of its activities during the year ended 30th June, 1941, together with its Balance Sheet and List of Subscribers.

Her Excellency, the Lady Gowrie, honoured us by her presence and sympathetic interest at the Annual Meeting of the League last November. She is, she said, a sincere believer in the work of Sir Truby King, whose methods had saved the lives of so many thousands of mothers and babies throughout the British Empire.

Our President, Lady Irvine, and other members have attended the Annual Meetings of most of our country Centres, motor transport having been provided by Mrs. W. A. Leitch, Mrs. C. B. Wheeler and Mr. J. T. Tweddle,

Our Mothercraft Centres at Kelvin Hall, Buckley's, Werribee, Dandenong, Springvale, Noble Park, Carrum Downs, Berwick, Upper Beaconsfield, Kilmore, Seymour, Euroa, North Balwyn, Swan Hill, Wycheproof, and our Visiting Nursing Service all report steady progress.

The first anniversary of the opening of the Truby King Mothercraft Centre at Buckley's was celebrated there by a "Birthday Party." Eighty mothers with their babies formed a guard of honour as Lady Irvine entered. Mrs. James Wilson provided a delightful afternoon tea and birthday cake. An outcome of this gathering has been the formation of a Mothers' Branch of the League, whose members hold a monthly entertainment to augment our funds. Mrs. A. L. Gerard is President, and Mrs. L. Fraser Hon Secretary.
