

Aims and Objects.

- 1. To Uphold the Sacredness of the Body and the Duty of Health; to inculcate a lofty view of the responsibilities of maternity and the duty of every mother to fit herself for the perfect fulfilment of the natural calls of motherhood, both before and after childbirth, and especially to advocate and promote the breast-feeding of infants.
- 2. To acquire accurate information and knowledge on matters affecting the Health of Women and Children, and to disseminate such knowledge through the agency of its members, nurses, and others, by means of the natural handing-on from one recipient or beneficiary to another, and the use of such agencies as periodical meetings at members' houses or elsewhere, demonstrations, lectures, correspondence, newspaper articles, pamphlets, books, etc.
- 3. To train specially and to employ qualified Nurses, to be called Plunket Nurses, whose duty it will be to give sound, reliable instruction, advice, and assistance, gratis, to any member of the community desiring such services, on matters affecting the health and well-being of women, especially during pregnancy and while nursing infants, and on matters affecting the health and well-being of their children; and also to endeavour to educate and help parents and others in a practical way in domestic hygiene in general all these things being done with a view to conserving the health and strength of the rising generation, and rendering both mother and offspring hardy, healthy, and resistive to disease.
- 4. To co-operate with any present or future organisations which are working for any of the foregoing or cognate objects.

N.B.—The Society was started as a League for mutual helpfulness and mutual education, with a full recognition of the fact that, so far as motherhood and babyhood were concerned, there was as much need for practical reform and "going to school" on the part of the cultured and well-to-do as there was on the part of the so-called "poor and ignorant."

23rd Annual Report

1942-43.

TO OUR MEMBERS AND SUPPORTERS.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

We have pleasure in reporting the passing of another successful year of the Society's existence, for despite the higher cost of living and extraordinary expenditure, the accounts show a surplus of £55 after writing off £217 for depreciation of assets.

Again we thank the Government of Victoria for their help in increasing our grant by £100 for the year, which covered the extra cost of wages paid to the staff.

Our arrangement with the Riversdale Golf Club to cater for its members was found impracticable owing to staff troubles, and was accordingly discontinued in February of this year, since when additional rent has been paid, but such increase has been covered by extra donations from its members, which we gratefully acknowledge.

As the cost of installing a bathroom in the mothers' quarters was estimated at £200, we did not continue with the project, and this has been greatly missed by the inmates. Whilst every alteration and improvement has been made within reason, the hospital is really not all that we could wish for in comfort and efficiency, and if other premises nearer the city and with the necessary conveniences can be found we would recommend a further move, provided the cost was not prohibitive.

The Twenty-second Annual Meeting was held on the 17th September, 1942, at the Riversdale Golf House, the late Mr. J. T. Tweddle persiding. The speakers were Lady Irvine, Lady Angliss, the Mayor of Footscray, Miss Murdock of the Infant Welfare Department, Matron Graham, and Mr. T. E. Doughton.

Report and Accounts presented for the year ended the 30th June, 1942, were adopted, and retiring office-bearers re-elected.

The ladies of the Central Auxiliary entertained the guests with afternoon tea, and a general inspection of the hospital quarters was made.

Obituary.

The death of our late esteemed Patron, Mr. J. T. Tweddle, is recorded with many regrets. A great and good man, who will be sadly missed, his kindly advice was never denied us, and his financial assistance not only established the Hospital, but at many times helped it out of difficulties. We trust that the Society and the Hospital which bears his name will go on to greater achievements, always standing as a monument to its patron and founder. We are able to make public the fact that the late Mr. Tweddle has set aside a portion of his estate, the income of which will be paid to the Society annually.

Resignation.

Sister E. Gayford resigned from the hospital staff in November, 1942. Miss K. Armorel Parker was appointed as staff nurse.

Infant Welfare Centres.

The work carried out by infant welfare sisters in their various centres, and the advice and assistance given to worried mothers in these days of stress and strain is vitally important.

Extracts from the Centre Sisters' Annual Reports:-

Sister Devine (Footscray) reports a slight increase of diarrhea amongst babies, and that mothers are experiencing difficulty in obtaining prunes, and suitable footwear for toddlers. Twelve student nurses from "Tweddle" Hospital attended the Centre for a period of three weeks each for Centre experience.

Sister Macpherson (Yarraville): Six student nurses attended this Centre for their three weeks' Centre experience.

Sister McKellar (Williamstown) mentions an increase of individual babies attending the Centre, also that a large proportion of children were immunised against diphtheria.

Sister K. F. McLennan (Swan Hill) states that 137 test feeds were given during the year, and 44 children immunised against diphtheria.

Sister Rawolle (Newport) has the unique happening of 12 sets of twins attending the Centre, their ages ranging from 4 months to $4\frac{1}{2}$ years. An additional point of interest is that Dr. Joel (Newport), a past lecturer and examiner at "Tweddle," was the doctor attendant on § sets.

Sister Rees (Upper Beaconsfield): On June 24, 1943, a play group in the morning was formed for children 2-6 years, with Mrs. Oldmeadon in charge each Thursday morning. Indoor and outdoor equipment is provided. Attendance of 12 children at first opening. Great interest and assistance is given by parents and the resident shire councillors.

Sister Outen (Seymour) mentions in her report that visiting soldiers' wives are attending Centres well:

Footscray Domestic Arts.

Lectures and demonstrations were given to students of the above school by Sister Stirling, of Kelvin Hall Infant Welfare Centre, Melbourne. Ten sat for the examinations last year, eight gained the Society's Schoolgirls' Certificate.

Also to Miss Peck (Assistant Director of Infant Welfare), for special instruction to trainees in recording Centre statistics.

The Executive and Matron appreciate the lectures given to the trainees on public speaking by Mr. F. Trainor. These lectures were previously given by the late Hon. J. Hume-Cook for many years.

"Tweddle" Hospital for Babies.

From the 1st July, 1942, to 30th June, 1943, 108 babies and 61 mothers were admitted, making a total of 169. These, with the addition of 8 babies and 3 mothers, carried over from the previous year, make a total of 116 babies, 64 mothers (180), being resident in hospital, and under treatment for varying periods.

The average length of stay has been 22.9 days for babies and 13.3 for mothers. Of these 108 babies under treatment six died, the infant mortality rate being 5.5 per cent.

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THREE LITTLE AUSTRALIANS WITH THEIR PROUD MOTHER.



A mother from the country entered Tweddle Hospital on 23rd December, 1942, with premature triplets. The trip was undertaken during the heat wave, and the mother was in an exhausted state on arrival, and remained so for a week.

In $4\frac{1}{2}$ years this mother had given birth to seven children—2 single babies, premature twins, and premature triplets. The parental history was not good. The mother was given special injections for enæmia, and the diet given was specially nutritious, plus additional vitamins, and as much sunshine, fresh air, and rest as possible.

The triplets were fed in their cots with expressed breast milk, and when over 5½ lbs. in weight, two were naturally fed alternately. The highest total of breast milk per day was 45 oz.

Additional express breast milk, vitamins, and iron, were given to these triplets, plus as much sunshine as possible. The mother's health improved considerably, and she was most grateful for the help and rest. The last report from home was satisfactory.

During the year the Executive applied to the Victorian Hospitals' Association for admission to membership. This was granted. This gives security of hospital equipment whenever possible. The goods and materials are of good value, and reasonably priced. Much valuable time is thus saved that would be otherwise used by the staff for shopping.

In conclusion, may we add a word of appreciation for the wholehearted loyal support of the members of the executive, who have ever been ready to assist with the work of the Society, and of the unselfish service under difficulties of Matron Graham and her staff at the Hospital, also for the great assistance given to the Society by all its members and of the several Auxiliaries in the form of services, goods, and money to help in the maintenance of the Hospital. May we have the privilege of their continued interest and support.

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THE TRUBY KING LEAGUE OF VICTORIA

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE LEAGUE.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

Your Committee has pleasure in submitting a summary of its activities during the year ended 30th June, 1943.

At our Annual Meeting, held at Messrs. Buckley and Nunn's, 11th November, 1942, the points stressed by the speakers — the Lady Mayoress, Lady Murdock, Lady Angliss, Mrs. C. B. E. Chambers, and Mr. J. T. Tweddle — were praise for the work of the League. The increasing need for the little ones of today having every opportunity of attaining to perfect development of body, mind, and spirit. That Sir Truby King's teaching, by closely following Nature's infallible laws, left no loophole for guesswork, but a safe and simple guide for the individual needs of every normal child. That it had been proved by scientific investigation that normal children, who were fed properly, and who enjoyed the other natural aids to healthy living, and careful home training, developed along right lines, mentally, physically, and morally That these facts served to emphasise the League's good fortune in being able to employ Sisters who had qualified in Infant Welfare at the Tweddle Hospital for Babies, or at Dunedin, Hobart, Sydney, London, or other places where Truby King methods and training schools were established.

The Truby King Centre at Dandenong continues to progress most satisfactorily under the guidance of Sisters Williams and Rees, with the co-operation of a fine local committee, of which Mrs. C. Cathness is the president. The smooth working of a nursery school within the Centre, and on a playground adjoining it, is a fine practical example of Dr. Scantlebury-Brown's desire to link up infant welfare with child guidance and expert supervision until school age. It is proving a boon to the mothers of toddlers and older children, and a great joy to the little folk themselves.

At Kilmore, our League has a branch that has been operating for the past eight years with unavoidably restricted space. And now, its enthusiastic committee, of which Mrs. J. J. Ryan is president, feels it is being rewarded for devoted service in the cause of mothers and babies by the backing, as it were, of the Shire Council in purchasing a fine building for the committee's sole use, as an Infant Welfare Centre. The building, which was erected for one of the leading banks, is two-storied, of solid brick and stone, and it opens directly on to the business part of the main street. With carefully thought out adjustments it will provide a model Infant Welfare Centre, containing waiting and consulting rooms, with ample space for test feeding cubicles, a room for the exclusive use of expectant mothers, play room, committee room, and parking

place for prams. Attractive grounds, with shady trees on two sides and at the back of the building, enhance the value of the property, especially for the purpose for which it was bought. We do indeed congratulate the ladies of the Kilmore Truby King Committee, and we look forward to helping them substantially in the near future, through the generosity of the H. V. McKay Trust, towards furnishing and equipping their Centre for the mothers of Kilmore and its extensive country districts.

Our Voluntary Centre, at 75 Doncaster Road, North Balwyn, was taken over as a Truby King Infant Welfare Centre by the Camberwell Municipal Council last December. This was the result of a deputation, consisting of Mrs. J. G. T. Smith, Mrs. J. C. Bush, and our Honorary Organising Secretary, that had waited on the Council for financial help, and had put its claims before that body. Later, the Centre was officially opened by the Mayoress of Camberwell as a unit of the activities of the Camberwell Municipality. Our Central Committee has thus been relieved of the sister's fees and the rent of the building. Mrs. J. G. T. Smith is still the enthusiastic president, and Mrs. J. C. Bush the hon. secretary of our North Balwyn Branch. We congratulate them.

"The 3XY Good Companions' Gift Centre," at the corner of Burke Road and Wattletree Road, East Malvern, is proving its value and need by the large number of mothers who attend with their babies on the three days a week that it is open. Sister Elaine Ferry reported that during the past twelve months there had been 242 individual babies at the Centre, with a total attendance of 2,188.

A successful gift party was again held at the home of our senior vice-president, Mrs. W. A. Leitch, on November 14, 1942, which netted approximately £212. In thanking the committee and helpers for their wonderful co-operation, Mrs. Leitch said she felt that the members' husbands should be especially thanked for their splendid support. Our committee joined in passing a very sincere vote of thanks to Mrs. Leitch for holding our gathering at her home, where they are always so well attended and enjoyed by everyone.

Sister Marion Stirling is doing good work as sister in charge of the Truby King Centre at Kelvin Hall. In addition to this she is giving a course of twelve lectures in Mothercraft to one hundred students at the Girls' School, Barkley Street, Footscray.

Sister Gladys Cowley, sponsored by the League, gave a course of lectures on Mothercraft to the students at the Invergowrie Hostel in the beginning of the year.

We very warmly appreciate the faithful work of all our Truby King Sisters in their various Centres.

We are again indebted to the H. V. McKay Trust for its liberal donation for the benefit of country mothers and their little ones. To the Marion E. H. Flack Trust, for its welcome contribution for our needy mothers and babies. To Messrs. Buckley and Nunn for the upkeep of our Truby King Mothercraft Centre on their

premises, which they so lavishly equipped, and for their generous contribution to our funds. To the management of the 3XY Broadcasting Station for its continued contribution of valuable air space for a weekly "talk to mothers." These talks are particularly appreciated by different groups of country mothers, who take and keep notes for future reference. We are indebted, too, to all who have made it possible to maintain and extend this national service for God and His little ones.

We wish to extend our sympathy to our President, Lady Irvine, in her recent bereavement. The passing of Sir William Irvine has meant the loss to the community of one of the most distinguished and most useful of its citizens.

We extend to Mrs. J. T. Tweddle and her family our very deep sympathy. By the passing of Mr. J. T. Tweddle on the 16th July, 1943, the League, as well as the Tweddle Hospital for Babies, has lost a loyal friend and most generous benefactor, whose kindly nature and Christian influence will be sadly missed.
