# Aims and Objects

I. To Uphold the Sacredness of the Body and the Duty of Health; to inculcate a lofty view of the responsibilities of maternity and the duty of every mother to fit herself for the perfect fulfilment of the natural calls of motherhood, both before and after childbirth, and especially to advocate and promote the breast-feeding of infants.

2. To acquire accurate information and knowledge on matters affecting the Health of Women and Children, and to disseminate such knowledge through the agency of its members, nurses, and others, by means of the natural handing-on from one recipient or beneficiary to another, and the use of such agencies as periodical meetings at members' houses or elsewhere, demonstrations, lectures, correspondence, newspaper articles, pamphlets, books, etc.

3. To train specially and to employ qualified Nurses, to be called Plunket Nurses, whose duty it will be to give sound, reliable instruction, advice and assistance, gratis, to any member of the community desiring such services, on matters affecting the health and well-being of women, especially during pregnancy and while nursing infants, and on matters affecting the health and well-being of their children; and also to endeavor to educate and help parents and others in a practical way in domestic hygiene in general—all these things being done with a view to conserving the health and strength of the rising generation, and rendering both mother and offspring hardy, healthy, and resistive to disease.

4. To co-operate with any present or future organisations which are working for any of the foregoing or cognate objects.

N.B.—The Society was started as a League for mutual helpfulness and mutual education, with a full recognition of the fact that, so far as motherhood and babyhood are concerned, there was as much need for practical reform and "going to school" on the part of the cultured and well-to-do as there was on the part of so-called "poor and ignorant."

1947-48

Ladies and Gentlemen.

This Report for the year ended 30th June, 1948, places before you the usual statistics and financial accounts which speak for themselves and proclaim the satisfactory work being carried out by the Tweddle Hospital in training Infant Welfare Sisters and Mothercraft Nurses and the steady dissemination of their knowledge and experience gained as they go about their vocation in the Infant Welfare Centres and homes of the mothers of Victoria.

Although each year sees about thirty trainees leaving for duty the demand by mothers and the Centres cannot be satisfied nor can the facilities at our hospital cope with the long waiting list of students clamoring for admittance.

We do look forward with impatient hopes to the day when we realise our plans for an up-to-date training school capable of taking more students, mothers and babies. It will be noted that the Building Fund is now £3,150, £450 having been added during the past year.

It was with regret that our Executive accepted the resignation in June last of Miss Gertrude Graham as Matron in charge of the Tweddle Hospital.

No words of ours could express the very high opinion held of her by all concerned. Apart from the excellent standard set by her in the training school it was her graciousness of manner and helpful co-operation at all times that endeared her to both students and staff alike.

Our most sincere wish is that her retirement will be a very happy and healthy one and that she will find time to keep in touch with the work she so loved.

Applications from suitably trained Plunket Sisters for the position of Matron of the Hospital were dealt with in May last and it was decided to appoint Sister Evelyn Ross in Miss Graham's stead.

Matron Ross is a Plunket sister, having trained at Tweddle some years ago and as she has held the positions of Tutor Sister and Assistant Matron at Riversdale and Footscray, we think we are fortunate in securing her services.

We are especially indebted to Sir William Angliss for a donation of £600 with which to purchase a motor car to facilitate the journeyings of Matron and the Sisters to and from the hospital and for its general use. With the shorter working hours and difficulty in obtaining staff the car will indeed be a great boon. Matron Ross very kindly undertook to pay the running costs so that no extra charge will fall upon our finances.

Coming to the finances of the Society we are happy to say that the year has shown a small surplus of Receipts over Expenditure of £12. The shorter working week has meant overtime to be paid for and this together with the several rises during the year in the salaries and wages paid have forced our domestic expenditure up 9%. Fortunately the Victorian Government has again come to the rescue with further aid.

A goodly attendance resulted at our last Annual Meeting held in Buckley & Nunn Emporium which Lady Dunwich declared open. The speakers were Dr. B. Meredith and Dr. V. L. Collins. Report and accounts for year ended 30th June, 1947, were adopted and retiring office-bearers re-elected.

### Kelvin Hall Infant Welfare Centre

This Centre maintained entirely by the Society carried on its good work during the year under the able management of Sister Stirling whose recent resignation (to take up a position in the Royal Alexandra Hospital for Sick Children) is to be regretted. Total number of attendances of babies was 2,750, whilst 1,257 phone consultations were given.

There is some doubt as to the carrying on of this Centre, but a temporary appointment of Sister Iles, from Hobart, has been made for the present.

### Showground Information Bureau

Sister Stirling did very good work here last Royal Show, setting up an attractive display under very cramped conditions, interviewing mothers who came for advice and generally carrying on the usual clinical work in a modified manner. Seventeen trained Nurses entered during the year as trainees for the Infant Welfare Course and they all passed the Hospital Examination, thus gaining our Certificate. Seventeen trainees also passed the State Infant Welfare Nurses' Board's examination—the names being Irene Isobel Sinclair, Elizabeth Pride Meyer, Rosa Hope Hasluck, Muriel Grace Everett, Jessie Valentine Wortley, Jean Elizabeth Floyd, Marjory Clare Callond Scoble, Irez Mabel Wilson, Edith Beatrice McDowall, Mary Winfield Marrie, Barbara Joyce Baillie, Anna Forbes Cockburn, Denise Mary Hull, Patricia Barklay Bane, Florence Margaret Hannah, Ethel Maud Powney, and Lilian Fletcher.

### Primrose Nurses

Twelve Primrose Probationers entered for training and the following completed their training and gained the Hospital Certificate in Mothercraft—Margaret Yates, Sheila R. Drake, Mary E. Ruketts, Margaret E. Ruston, Margaret L. Shaw, Joan R. Horner, Mollie A. Drake-Brockman, Lowana G. Chapman, Patricia Whitburne, Valerie I. Lilley, Elizabeth J. Sutherland, Ursula T. Hill.

We would remark here that the period of training of Primrose Nurses has been extended to 15 months—two months of the Course being spent in residence at the Footscray Creche and Pre-School Centres where valuable experience will be gained in handling the toddlers and pre-school child.

## "Invergowrie" Homecraft Hostel Students

Sister Stirling has again delivered lectures and given demonstrations to an enthusiastic class of students at "Invergowrie" during the year. Practical examinations were carried out by Matron Graham, Sisters Anderson and Ross, 50 students being examined, and 49 being successful in gaining the Schoolgirls' Mothercraft Certificate.

Miss Goldenberg, the Pre-School Educational Supervisor of the Infant Welfare Department, lectured to the Primrose Nurse Trainees on "The Pre-School Child." Seven lectures were given. The students were also taken on conducted tours by Miss Goldenberg to the following Centres:—The Dame Nellie Melba Kindergarten, The Lady Northcote Kindergarten, and the Alice Lovell Clark Kindergarten. The students recorded their observations as practical "onlookers," afterwards each compiling a book containing the outstanding points of the lectures and emphasising the practical features noted at the Centres.

The Executive and Matron Graham wish to thank Miss Goldenberg for her interest and valued instruction to the student nurses.

### Staff Changes

## "Tweddle" Hospital for Babies

From the 1st July, 1947, to 30th June, 1948, 181 babies and 120 mothers were admitted, making a total of 301. These, with the addition of 10 babies and 4 mothers carried from the previous year, make a total of 191 babies and 124 mothers, all being resident in hospital, and under treatment for varying periods during the year.

The average length of stay has been 20.9 days for babies and 9.14 for mothers. Of these 181 babies under treatment, one died, the infant mortality rate being .52 per cent.


