# Aims and Objects

1. To Uphold the Sacredness of the Body and the Duty of Health; to inculcate a lofty view of the responsibilities of maternity and the duty of every mother to fit herself for the perfect fulfilment of the natural calls of motherhood, both before and after childbirth, and especially to advocate and promote the breast-feeding of infants.

2. To acquire accurate information and knowledge on matters affecting the Health of Women and Children, and to disseminate such knowledge through the agency of its members, nurses, and others, by means of the natural handing-on from one recipient or beneficiary to another, and the use of such agencies as periodical meetings at members' houses or elsewhere, demonstrations, lectures, correspondence, newspaper articles, pamphlets, books, etc.

3. To train specially and to employ qualified Nurses, to be called Plunket Nurses, whose duty it will be to give sound, reliable instruction, advice and assistance, gratis, to any member of the community desiring such services, on matters affecting the health and well-being of women, especially during pregnancy and while nursing infants, and on matters affecting the health and well-being of their children; and also to endeavor to educate and help parents and others in a practical way in domestic hygiene in general—all these things being done with a view to conserving the health and strength of the rising generation, and rendering both mother and offspring hardy, healthy, and resistive to disease.

4. To co-operate with any present or future organisations which are working for any of the foregoing or cognate objects.

N.B.—The Society was started as a League for mutual helpfulness and mutual education, with a full recognition of the fact that, so far as motherhood and babyhood are concerned, there was as much need for practical reform and "going to school" on the part of the cultured and well-to-do as there was on the part of the so-called "poor and ignorant."

29th Annual Report

1948-49

Ladies and Gentlemen,

We have pleasure in placing before you our twenty-ninth Annual Report and in doing so would draw your attention to the fact that it covers a nine months period to the 31st March, 1949, instead of the usual twelve months; this alteration has been made for the convenience of the Charities Commission.

Despite the shorter working period and the inconvenience caused by the renovating of the Hospital Buildings an increased number of babies and mothers were admitted for treatment and the average of trainees in residence was kept up.

A sum of £2,000 was expended on alterations, additions and renovations to the Buildings which has placed them in an excellent condition for the carrying on of our work in an efficient and up-to-date manner.

The expenditure of this large sum was absolutely necessary, but has caused a serious drain on our income which was up £450 on the corresponding period in 1947/8. Ordinary expenditure was up £530 mainly attributable to increased cost of provisions and higher wages and for the first time in many years the accounts show a deficiency of £1,852 on our Maintenance Account. This deficiency has since been made up by the Sale of Bonds to the extent of £1,000 and by an additional grant from the Government.

We do thank most sincerely our Auxiliaries for their untiring efforts in raising funds for the carrying on of our work, for without them we could not hope to cope with the ever increasing overhead costs of maintaining our Hospital.

The twenty-eighth Annual Meeting was held in the Women's Services Club on the 20th September, 1948, at which our President presided, the speakers being the Director of Infant Welfare, Dr. Meredith and the City Health Officer, Dr. John Dale.

The accounts tor the year ended 30th June, 1948, presented to the Meeting were adopted and retiring Executive re-elected.

### Kelvin Hall Infant Welfare Centre

The closing of the Infant Welfare Centre at Kelvin Hall during the period under review was very much regretted, but owing to the financial strain caused by its upkeep and the difficulty of obtaining a suitable sister, it was thought best to take that action. An excellent Centre is maintained by the Truby-King League at Buckley & Nunn's.

# Showground Information Bureau

The Society's Stand at the Royal Show held in September was presided over by Sister Douglas, who with the help of Primrose Nurses met country mothers with their babies and gave advice and help where necessary. The Kiosk is a great boon to the tired mothers who can change and feed the infants and rest awhile away from the noise and crowds.

# Hospital Training

Twelve trained Nurses entered during these nine months as trainees for the Infant Welfare Centre. One unfortunately had her training terminated by sickness at home, but the remainder passed both the Hospital and State Examinations— Vera Kitson Keeling, Joyce Irene Berryman, Joan Margaret Salter, Gwen Irene Batterham, Charlotte Helen Hack, Joyce Ruth Bewsher, Constance Clara Box, Mary Catherine Considine, Annie Ella Gallager, Marie Alice Grace and Ruby Evelyn Russell.

# Primrose Nurses

Eight Primrose Nurses entered for training. Following are the names of those who completed their training in Mothercraft and passed the Hospital Examination. They have also passed the State Examination—Susan Mary Harding Smith, Ruth Ellen Cole, Ann Rosemary Stewart, Pamela Edith Lucraft, Florence Eleanor Fagg, Elizabeth Jean Thomas, Jocelyn Elizabeth Fisken, and Elsie Ackland Richards.

All these Nurses completed fifteen months training, two months of which was spent in residence at the Footscray Creche and Kindergarten. This additional training has been appreciated by the trainees as it widens their experience considerably.

### "Invergowrie" Homecraft Hostel Students

Sister Graham has very ably given lectures to 56 students this year. As this report is early the examination has not yet been held, but we are expecting a very satisfactory result.

#### Staff Changes

Early in the year we regretfully received the resignation of Sister Rita Douglas, our Tutor Sister, who over the period of a year had maintained a particularly high standard of lecturing and practical instruction to the students.

Sister Evaline Graham was appointed in her stead and has carried on a difficult position most ably.

In November Sister Edith M. Dowall left the staff to be married. We all wish her every happiness and thank her for her untiring efforts on behalf of the Hospital through the Primrose Nurses' Auxiliary.

Sister Ila Smith was appointed in her place and commenced duty at the beginning of March.

# "Tweddle" Hospital for Babies

From the 1st July, 1948, to the 31st March, 1949, 188 babies and 121 mothers were admitted, making a total of 309. These, with the addition of 10 babies and one mother carried from the previous year, make a total of 198 babies and 122 mothers, all being resident in the Hospital and under treatment for varying periods during the year.

The average length of stay has been 18 days for babies and 7.2 days for Mothers. Of these 188 babies under treatment eight died. All were prematures and four in the pre-viable groups.

# To Our Members:

We have missed her from recent meetings and hope that after a rest she will be well and strong enough to visit her friends again. Mrs. G. Connor's resignation was accepted with regret. Her young "Tweddle" baby takes up most of her time.

It was with deep regret that we heard of the passing of Mrs. F. B. Suhr, who had been a member since the early days of the Auxiliary. She was a tireless worker and took an active part in all our doings. To her relatives we extend our sincerest sympathy.

Last July the Auxiliary organised an evening party at the British Music Society's Rooms, in honour of Miss G. Graham, on her retirement from her duties as Matron of Tweddle. All Auxiliary and Executive members were invited to attend. Gas rationing and the fact that the evening was one of the coldest of the winter did not detract from the spirit of warmth and friendliness. A cheque was presented to Miss Graham with the best wishes of Executive and Auxiliary members. We record our thanks to Miss I. Mornement, Mr. R. Beswicke, and Miss Flora Anderson for adding to the enjoyment of the evening.

Although no spectacular results were achieved during the nine months under review, members readily and cheerfully cooperated in all the Auxiliary's activities and are enthusiastically planning future activities to raise funds for the Hospital. During this period the principal source of revenue was derived from the Wattle Day and Hospital Day Appeals. Button selling is no easy task and we are very grateful to Primrose Nurses, Mesdames Cornwell, Bryant, Davis and Merrell, and other members for the splendid work done by them in selling buttons on these days.

On Hospital Day members organised a stall which was well stocked with many attractive goods. Mrs. Hill very kindly produced a number of pieces of material which members made up into aprons, children's clothing, and other readily saleable articles. The stall realised £20/15/-. Button sales were £56/8/8.

The total amount received as a result of the Wattle Day Appeal was  $\pounds 86/13/9$ . This amount included the sum of  $\pounds 15/12/3$  received as a result of button sales by members of the Staff and Employees of W. Angliss & Co., Footscray, and

a donation of £12/10/- from Sir William Angliss. We record our very sincere appreciation of the generous help given by these kind friends.

Members have shown their interest in the welfare of the Hospital in a variety of other ways. At frequent intervals two members visit the Hospital, acting as a House Committee. The sum of £10/10/- was sent to Matron for Christmas at the Hospital. One member recently handed Matron a donation towards the cost of a much needed blanket cupboard. # 18th ANNUAL REPORT PRIMROSE NURSES' AUXILIARY

In presenting the 18th Annual Report of the Primrose Nurses' Auxiliary, I am placed in the rather unique position of representing both the Hospital and the Auxiliary, so that some of my remarks may cover a wider field than is usual.

At our last Annual Meeting we were fortunate to have as our speaker, Mrs. R. G. Casey, who gave us a most interesting and enlightening talk on her experiences in India.

Our financial period has been shortened to nine months this year as the new Hospitals Commission is closing all Hospital Balance Sheets in March instead of June. The nine months of the report now in hand commenced under the leadership of Sister McDowall, who with her tremendous enthusiasm obtained such wonderful results for the Appeal which she organised, to raise funds for the installation of an Electric Hot Water System in the Nurses' Home. The work was completed at the end of October and the result has proved well worth the effort.

At the end of November we said farewell to Sister McDowall who left the Hospital Staff to be married. We all wish her a very happy future and thank her sincerely for her "Job well done."

In August we had the extreme good fortune to be chosen by the Footscray Old Boys' Football Club as the charity with which their club would be affiliated. As the result of street stalls and an entertainment carnival, with which the Nurses assisted, we benefited to the extent of £155/14/4. We wish to express our gratitude for their keen interest in our work, and the many advantages we have been able to enjoy due to their helpful endeavours.

The response to the Christmas Appeal this year was very gratifying, and we wish to thank sincerely all those whose generosity resulted in the largest total ever, £126/2/6.

Considerable alterations and renovations have been made to the Hospital of late. The Hospital was painted inside and out and the Primrose Auxiliary undertook to renovate most of the soft furnishings. New curtains were made for the Mother's Cottage, Dining-room, Nurses' Bed-rooms and Dayroom. New light shades were provided for the Cottage, Dining-room and Babies' Nurseries; and a bed-lamp for each Nurse. As the Hospital was only equipped with an Icechest, which proved quite inadequate during summer months, we felt proud that we were able to purchase a Stainless Steel-lined Frigidaire at a cost of £186, which has proved a wonderful asset.

In May, 1948, we had as a Cottage Mother, Mrs. H. G. Wood and her baby son, Thomas. Thomas was rather a sick little baby and was with us for some time, but eventually went home with happy and apparently very grateful parents, for since then the Executive have had reason to appreciate their generosity and at Christmas time we were amazed to receive a cheque for £50 for the Nurses' Auxiliary. We can but be thankful our efforts have given them such joy with their lovely son.

We would also like to thank Mrs. Featonby, who was kind enough to organise a card party for our benefit, which raised  $\frac{f4}{5}$ .

We offer our best thanks and congratulations to all our members who have been married, become mothers or passed their final exams. during the past nine months. To those who have filled the positions of office-bearers we extend our thanks, and I would now like to close this report with a fervent wish for a successful and progressive year to follow.
