

Aims and Objects


1. To Uphold the Sacredness of the Body and the Duty of Health; to inculcate a lofty view of the responsibilities of maternity and the duty of every mother to fit herself for the perfect fulfilment of the natural calls of motherhood, both before and after childbirth, and especially to advocate and promote the breast-feeding of infants.

2. To acquire accurate information and knowledge on matters affecting the Health of Women and Children, and to disseminate such knowledge through the agency of its members, nurses, and others, by means of the natural handing on from one recipient or beneficiary to another, and the use of such agencies as periodical meetings at members' houses or elsewhere, demonstrations, lectures, correspondence, newspaper articles, pamphlets, books, etc.

3. To train specially and to employ qualified Nurses, to be called Plunket Sisters, whose duty it will be to give sound, reliable instruction, advice and assistance, gratis, to any member of the community desiring such services, on matters affecting the health and well-being of women, especially during pregnancy and while nursing infants, and on matters affecting the health and well-being of their children; and also to endeavour to educate and help parents and others in a practical way in domestic hygiene in general—all these things being done with a view to conserving the health and strength of the rising generation, and rendering both mother and offspring hardy, healthy, and resistive to disease.

4. To co-operate with any present or future organisations which are working for any of the foregoing or cognate objectives.

N.B.—The Society was started as a League for mutual helpfulness and mutual education, with a full recognition of the fact that, so far as motherhood and babyhood are concerned, there was as much need for practical reform and "going to school" on the part of the cultured and well-to-do as there was on the part of the so-called "poor and ignorant."

34th Annual Report

Ladies and Gentlemen,

We have pleasure in placing before you our Report of Hospital activities for the year ended 31st March, 1954.

This period has been an extremely busy time for our Matron and Staff as is evidenced by the following figures: total admissions of Mothers and Babies 474, including 258 Babies; average stay of patients being: Mothers 7 days, and 27.5 days for Babies. The teaching side of the Hospital's endeavours has also been well maintained as Infant Welfare Sisters and Mothercraft Nurses successfully completed their training. A liaison has been formed with the Women's Hospital and Tweddle is now able to help premature babies to recover and maintain swift and sure progress. Interesting particulars are included later in this report.

We are indeed grateful to Matron Graham for conducting and supervising the Hospital so efficiently. Our sincere thanks must go to her and her staff for maintaining the Hospital at such high standards. The co-operation of our Matron and Staff is an asset to the Society.

The enclosed financial accounts indicate that the Hospital has further consolidated itself, despite a deficit of $\pounds76/19/5$ and a further rise on the overdraft of $\pounds250$. Grants from the Victorian Government received after 31st March, 1954, have alleviated the position since that date and some improvement should be shown in the future. Actual expenditure decreased in this period by $\pounds320$, whilst receipts have fallen by $\pounds273$. The Building Fund stands in credit at $\pounds3,238$.

Once again the Executive extends their congratulations to the Auxiliaries and members for their contributions to the Hospital over the past year. Their untiring efforts in raising funds for the carrying on of our work is to be highly commended, for without them, we could not cope in maintaining the Hospital.

Thirty-third Annual Meeting

This Meeting was held on 1st July, 1953, at the War Nurses' Centre. It was presided over by Lady Angliss and Guest Speakers included Dr. B. Meredith, Mrs. J. G. Norris and Sister Holmes.

New Nurses' Wing

During the year, a new wing to the Nurses' Quarters was added to our Hospital Buildings. The seven single rooms have been tastefully furnished with assistance from the Auxiliaries. Finance for the additions was raised by donations from Lady Angliss, £1,000, and Plunkett Auxiliary, £100.

Pre-School Lectures

These lectures were given by Miss Stubbs, Pre-school Officer of the Public Health Department. Tours of inspection, under supervision, were done at the Kingsville Centre — which is only a short distance from the Hospital.

"Invergowrie" Homecraft Hostel

Sister Lewes gave lectures and demonstrations to 65 students. Examiners Matron Graham and Sister R. Douglas. All students were successful in both sections.

Staff Changes

Sister Box and Staff Nurse R. Cameron were replaced by Sister Hack and Staff Nurse N. Stalker.

Tweddle Hospital Report

The past year has followed the pattern of other years; and it has been a time of interesting work for all concerned.

Dr. Deem, Director of Child Care in New Zealand, visited in March, 1954, and much useful knowledge was gained in the changes that have proved satisfactory in Artificial Feeding and more knowledge of Supervision of the Pre-school Child in the Infant Welfare field in New Zealand.

Feeding Tables now are identical with the Victorian Guide and have been applied with good results at the Training School.

Supervision and knowledge of the Pre-school child is now to be given to the Infant Welfare Students by visiting Centres with a Tutor Sister from the Infant Welfare Section of the Public Health Department. These special Centres have the services of a Medical Officer, so knowledge can be gained by Clinics and will be of paramount value to the student, also as a liaison with all members interested in Child Care and Development.

Babies without Mothers: Premature Babies, transferred from Women's Hospital; 3-5 lbs. weight 40

These babies remain in hospital until 6 lbs. 8 ozs. then arrangements are made for the Mother to be instructed for 48 hours in the care of baby; making of milk mixture; and mothercraft details; then they are both discharged and given detailed instructions to report to Outpatients' Pedriatrician at the Women's Hospital — later to the Sister-in-Charge of that particular Infant Welfare Centre. This plan has now been in operation for 12 months and has proved satisfactory for all concerned.

Nurse Cameron's resignation was accepted, and Nurse Stalker has carried on in the interests of the Auxiliary and Nurses — doing a good job.

The past year has been a time of interesting and hard work for all the members. All meetings have been well attended and some helpful suggestions and ideas have been put into action to raise funds.

The aim and object was to supply the soft furnishings of the rooms in the New Wing. This we were able to do, with less expense than we anticipated, as all curtains, bedspreads and table-covers were made in our own Sewing Room, with the assistance of the Seamstress and Staff.

Crockery, Breakfast Unit — has been supplied to each Nurse, for her own use while in training.

The Ironing Room has been completed with skirt board, two large tables, two irons, hoists and linen basket. Sectioned shelves for un-ironed clothes, full width of the wall, have been made and put in position. These extras now make the ironing problem much easier for students as well as the nurses. The wardrobe for the older child had clothes added in the form of cardigans, rompers and sun-suits.

The Nurses' Sittingroom has two swan-neck lamps. These the nurses find very helpful when studying or writing lectures.

The money has been raised by the nurses and they have had the help of the Footscray Technical School Old Boys' Association.

Permission was granted for Collections at the Football matches and this swelled the funds by £155/17/4.

The Dance which was organised and financed by the Nurses was a very enjoyable evening.

Christmas Appeal and Wattle Day efforts were given to the Hospital.

On behalf of the Nurses, I would like to thank Matron for the interest and co-operation in all activities for the Auxiliary Funds, and with the keen interest being shown by Seniors, our Junior Members and Office-bearers for the forthcoming year, we shall hope to do better during the coming year.

Whilst we have not donated any specific items to our Hospital, Association members have actively assisted other Auxiliaries to raise funds for Tweddle.


We trust that next year will see our Auxiliary welcoming new members from nurses who have just completed their training.
