





## Dame Jacobena Angliss, D.B.E.



It is with great regret that we record the death of our President, Dame Jacobena Angliss D.B.E. Dame Jacobena was a member of the Hospital Committee from its inception in 1920 and was elected President in 1941, a position she held with great distinction until her death.

She was an inspiring President who had the great gift of gaining people's interest in the Hospital and holding their loyalty over many years. She was most generous in her gifts and in offering her two homes for the delightful luncheons held to raise money for the Hospital. She was also a practical President who was concerned about the mothers and babies in the Hospital, the conditions in which the staff worked and the happy atmosphere created by Matron and her staff.

Dame Jacobena had three special interests — her great affection for her family, her love of music and her care and concern for children. It is especially fitting that the Pre-School Centre which was opened in August this year was named after her as she had done so much to establish it.

Those of us who knew and loved her will remember her always as a gifted and talented woman whose warm friendship was extended to all around her and whose practical care and concern for children in the community has made many young lives healthier and happier.

The principal activity of the Hospital during the course of the year was to act as a public Hospital and training school.

In accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 1961 of Victoria the Councillors state that -

- (a) Before the statement of profit and loss and balance sheet of the company were made out:
  - (1) They took reasonable steps so far as debts owing to the company are concerned to ascertain what action had been taken in relation to the writing eff of bad debts and the making of provisions for doubtful debts and to cause all known bad debts to be written off and adequate provision to be made for doubtful debts, and at the date of this report they are not aware of any circumstances which would render the amount written off for bad debts or the amount of the provision for doubtful debts inadequate to any substantial extent; and
  - (ii) they took reasonable steps to ascertain that any current assets of the company other than debtors referred to above were shown in the accounting records of the company at a value which they might be expected to realise in the ordinary course of business, and at the date of this report they are not aware of any circumstances which would render the values attributed to current assets misleading.
- (b) At the date of this report:
  - (i) no charge on the assets of the Company has arisen since 30th June, 1980 to secure the liabilities of any other person; and
  - (ii) no contingent liability has arisen since 30th June, 1980.
- (c) No contingent or other liability has become enforceable or is likely to become enforceable within the period of twelve months after 30th June, 1980 which, in the opinion of the Councillors will or may affect the ability of the company to meet its obligations as and when they fall due.
- (d) At the date of this report the Councillors are not aware of any circumstances not otherwise dealt with in this report which would render any amount stated in the accounts misleading.
- (e) The results of the company's operations in the year ended 30th June, 1980 were not, in the opinion of the Councillors substantially affected by any item, transaction, or event of a material and unusual nature.
- (f) Since 30th June, 1980 to date of this report there has not arisen any item, transaction of a material and unusual nature likely, in the opinion of the Councillors, to affect substantially the results of the operation of the company for the next succeeding financial year.

One of the Councillors, Mr. W. A. Jamieson, is a member of a firm which acts as printers to the Hospital. Since 30th June, 1978, no other Councillor has received or has become entitled to receive any benefit by reason of a contract made by the Hospital with the Councillor, or with a firm of which he has a substantial financial interest.

## MATRON'S REPORT

It is with pleasure I report that 1979-80 has been an interesting and busy year for all at "Tweddle". We have seen the phasing-out of the Infant Welfare Course in February, 1980 after fifty-six years.

During the last year, students from the Footscray Institute of Technology doing the Child Care Studies (Applied Social Science Course) have continued to come to "Tweddle" in groups of five for practical experience.

Negotiations continued over the year with many meetings being held to establish the Jacobena Angliss Pre-School Centre at "Tweddle". This beautiful Pre-School Centre was officially opened by Lady Winneke on 24th July, 1980. The Pre-School Centre has an extended hours programme — 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. — and is able to admit 23 children (three places being kept for children with a special problem). Mrs. Heather Tavener was appointed as Directress and Mrs. Barbara Clarke, Assistant. So far, two students (one female and one male) from Footscray Technical College have come for practical experience.

The Centre is functioning at its full capacity and proving to be a great service to the children who attend.

West Footscray Rotary Club were most generous in giving \$3,000 towards the cost of equipment and the Soroptimist International of Cut Paw Paw also were generous in giving \$500 towards cost of equipment.

## KINDERGARTEN OPENING

### DOCTOR GLYN WHITE RECALLS

In 1920 the Society for the Health of Women and Children of Victoria was founded by three persons who must have been vitally interested in the well-being of mothers and infants, especially those resident in the State of Victoria.

The stated objects of the Society were:—

- To educate potential mothers and mothers in the essential work of mothercraft.
- 2. To promote the natural feeding of infants.
- To see that the baby, where the natural supply has failed, is put on to a food approximately as nearly as possible to human milk.
- 4. To disseminate knowledge with respect to maternity matters.
- To place fully qualified nurses in charge of given districts in order that those requiring attention may receive it.

These three far-sighted, caring people were Sister Maude Primrose, Doctor J. W. Springthorpe and Mr. J. Hume-Cook. I did not have the privilege of meeting Doctor Springthorpe or Mr. Hume-Cook; but, in my youth and student days, through a common family friend, I did meet Sister Primrose. She was a kindly, public-spirited, resolute individual and I have a feeling that she may have been the principal initiating factor in the launching of this worthwhile adventure.

The first President of the Society was the Hon. H. G. Aikman, M.L.C.; Doctor Springthorpe was the first Chairman of Council; the Honorary Secretary was Mr. Humcook and I note the Medical and Advisory Board consisted of Doctor Stanley Argyle, Doctor Charles Perry, Doctor Allan Robertson, Doctor J. W. Springthorpe and Doctor Ramsay Webb, all leading figures in the medical profession of the day.

Reading through the list of Presidents I find that the Hon. J. G. Aikman was followed by Doctor Springthorpe from 1921 to 1932. The Hon. J. Hume-Cook from 1933 to 1941 and from 1941 our revered Dame Jacobena Angliss — surely this has been an outstanding effort on her part and I can assure you she still is, as she has always

been, such a vital factor in the successful progress of the original Society which in July 1958 was taken over by The Tweddle Baby Hospital from the then Trustees, Mr. S. A. Davis and Mr. A. S. H. Gifford.

The early rate of progress, judged by today's standards, was phenomenal. I'm sure those early workers realized there was a problem and they went ahead with determined resolve to achieve their objective, for in 1920 the first Centre was established in Coburg, followed in 1921 by Centres in Footscray and Preston. In 1922 lease of the present hospital site was granted by the Footscray Council for a Baby Hospital and Nurses' Training and Nurses' Training Two years later The School. Tweddle Hospital for Babies and the School of Mothercraft was officially opened by the Countess of Stradbroke. Later that year the training of Infant Welfare Sisters was commenced. These achievements could not have been achieved without financial backing and I am led to believe that a very generous donation from Mr. J. T. Tweddle, after whom the Hospital is named, enabled the project to develop in such a spectacular fashion. He must have been a very modest donor as I have been unable to find any record concerning the gift.

In 1925 erection of Nurses' Quarters on the block facing Sydney Street, on land donated by the Footscray Council, was completed. In the following year The Jane Douglas Endowment Fund was established which was to ensure the proper maintenance of the buildings in the future years.

In 1927 the first grant from the Government of Victoria was received and the first Auxiliary was formed in Footscray.

In 1945 the freehold title to the hospital site was donated by the Footscray Council.

In 1958 the Foundation Stone of the new hospital was laid by Dame Mary Herring and the new Hospital was officially opened by Her Excellency Lady Slim the following year, and Toddlers were admitted to the Hospital for the first time.

1961 saw the completion of the new dining-room, kitchen and store-rooms and in 1963 saw the opening of the William Angliss Nurses' Home by Doctor John Lindell who was at the time Chairman of the Hospitals and Charities Commission. Later that year saw the completion of the new Eirene Angliss Mothers and Babies Building. The old Nurses' Quarters were renovated and the landscaping of the grounds completed.

The success of any hospital depends not on the elegance of the

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buildings but the people who work in it from day to day; the people who are responsible for its overall administration and the large body of helpers by whose voluntary efforts necessary funds are raised to maintain it.

I suppose first credit must go to the five Matrons, for without them the Hospital could not have made available the highest standards of Mother and Baby care and of student training in the fields of Infant and Mothercraft Nursing.

Miss L. G. Moreland was Matron from 1920 to 1934; Miss Gertrude Graham from 1934 to 1948; Miss Evelyn Ross from 1948 to 1950; Miss Evelyn Graham from 1950 to 1968, and since then, our present Matron, Miss Ballard.

I did not have the privilege of working with the first three. I first met Miss Evelyn Graham during the war in Singapore on a Hospital Ship, and she kindly brought back to my wife some gifts I had collected. And so in late 1948 when she approached me to fill, temporarily, a vacancy on the Honorary Medical Staff I could hardly refuse, and I find myself still here.

Miss Ballard has carried on since 1968 in such a manner as to have gained the admiration, respect and affection of all who have been variously associated with her.

No history of "Tweddle" would be complete without reference to gene ous benefactors, too numerous to mention, who have enabled the Hospital to maintain such a satisfactory financial position. I must now pay tribute also to the role played by the Auxiliaries of the Hospital for giving such sustained, praiseworthy support. The Central Auxiliary whose energetic President, Miss May Angliss, and her many willing helpers continue to surprise the members of the Finance and Administration Committee with the size of the amounts of money they raise. The Plunket Sisters' Auxiliary presided over by Miss I. Stevenson; Group "26" convened by Miss Iris Williams and the Women's Group convened by Mrs. Burton, all have earned the Hospital's most grateful thanks.

In conclusion I mention that with the recent reorganization of Nursing Training, where the training of Mothercraft Nurses and Infant Welfare Sisters has become Collegenot hospital-based, our training school activities have been somewhat curtained. However, our hospital function — the caring of mothers, babies and toddlers — will continue. With the change, much space in the Nurses' Home became vacant and after careful consideration and not wanting such accommodation to be wasted, the

I feel sure that the original founders, faced with the same conditions, produced by factors beyond our control, would have made the same decision, a decision which will provide continuing benefit to many Pre-School children residing in the Hospital area. And which, today, is to be so appropriately named "The Jacobena Angliss Kindergarten".

## First Annual Report

The Pre-School Centre has its full quota of 23 children, which shows the need this extended hours centre fulfills for the children in this area.

The mothers have co-operated well, several of them coming for 2-3 hours in the morning to help with the distribution of milk and fruit. Some mothers have made painting smocks for the children and others are making dolls' clothes. As the children come from a variety of ethnic backgrounds it is especially good for their mothers to be involved in this way.

Two students from The Child Care Course at the Footscray Institute have each spent their five weeks training period at the Centre. It is good to see Tweddles' role as a training school being fulfilled in a new way.

During the first three months, the children have learnt to share toys, develop their independence, make friends and develop their confidence and skills. All of this training will make things much easier for those who enter school next year.
