







President's Report

Every parent needs support at some time. Our research has found that the ease with which parents care for a new baby is not determined by income or by the suburb in which we live. We all experience a lack of confidence and need support in our parenting journey from family, friends and from time to time, Tweddle.

The Board recognises the value of parents own voice about their parenting skills by advocating for the continuation of self referral to early parenting services by women and families. Tweddle also remains committed to working with referring professionals and in particular Maternal Child Health Nurses and General Practitioners.

Over the last year, the Board has focused on setting the strategic direction of the service rather than providing higher level management. We have been able to do this not only because of the calibre of our Board membership but because of the depth of management expertise provided by our recently appointed Chief Executive Officer, Vivienne Amery.

Through the work of our Vice President, Lesley Yates, and our Treasurer, Michael Smith, we have more clearly articulated the outcomes we want the Service to achieve and aligned our budget policies to support the achievement of these outcomes. We know from surveys and research that Tweddle each year makes an enormous difference to the lives of the three thousand families who use our services. However government funding continues to be set at a level that does not cover the actual cost of providing care to children and families. Government policy promotes a focus on early childhood development and strengthening the parenting capacity of families. There is a high level of demand for our service. It is difficult for the Board and our community to reconcile stated government policy with our continued underfunding.

The Board has recently sought to address our deficit by determining those services that are central to Tweddle and for which we will continue to find the funds to support – either by advocacy to government or through fundraising. This includes our residential and day stay programs. We have also identified those programs that we now expect to be cost neutral or revenue positive. The Prison Program is an example of such a program.

The Board's priority setting has identified the importance of service provision to families that have been determined by the Victorian Department of Human Services to be "at risk" of entering the child protection system. However we remain equally committed to providing services that prevent children and families ever coming close to being "at risk". Tweddle enthusiastically awaits the completion of the State Government Review of Early Parenting Services. We look to government for funding which reflects the real cost rather than the historic cost of our services. We are keen to further our partnership with the States' early parenting centres and the Department in developing more creative approaches to service delivery to ensure all Victorian children and families have access to high quality parenting programs.

The Board is actively looking at trends in service design and changes in our population that will shape the parenting services of the future. Over the next decade, parenting services will need to move away from service design reflective of the way we lived at the time when government funds were first made available. The current historically determined age cap (4 years) for children in Victoria's early parenting services can be anticipated to change as parents give voice to their need for parenting services beyond their child's fourth birthday. We also anticipate there will be increasing demand for services providing support in parenting teenagers. Tweddle has for some years been providing home based and day stay programs - a shift away from the residential model. We anticipate the demand for such service choices will continue to grow in coming years.

A significant new initiative this year has been the establishment of "Friends of Tweddle", a support base of over 150 parents and community leaders throughout Australia. We express our appreciation to all our Friends and look forward to regular opportunities to work together to advocate on parenting issues. I would like to thank all my fellow Board members, and particularly acknowledge the work of our retiring Board members: Adam Fry and Julie Collette for their contribution to early parenting in Victoria.

On behalf of the Board I would like to thank our Chief Executive Officer, Vivienne Amery, for her dedication and her attention to what matters. Through Vivienne's work many of the Board's long term objectives are now becoming a reality. We have a multi disciplinary team in place, improved triage and our resources are targeting attention to improving the management of waiting times. We have strengthened our partnerships with referring professionals, tertiary providers and research centres, evident in our collaboration with the Key Centre for Women's Health in Society.

Congratulations to Vivienne and all the staff at Tweddle for the achievements of the last twelve months.



CEO Report



To meet client needs our service has become broader. Tweddle today is certainly much more than a 'sleep school'. Assisting parents in managing sleep is still critical, but there are so many other issues that clients want to work on, while they stay with us.

We are very pleased to have developed a new psychology service. This service complements existing programs and provides support for families in day and residential programs.

Through the year a number of new programs have come on stream. A new outdoor playground has been a boon for toddlers, parents and staff alike. The refurbished indoor playroom is now a more stimulating environment. Our early childhood experts have developed new play, dance and music therapies.

In the 21st century, it is not feasible to offer a service in isolation, no matter how good that service may be. External relationships are now more important than ever for Tweddle. A relationship has been established with the internationally recognised

early intervention centre, Taralye, which provides oral language programs for deaf children and their families. In March, Taralye began operating one-day per week from our refurbished former "Matron's Cottage". Due to demand, the service is now operating two days per week. To see deaf children in the west being helped by this service, is very rewarding. In turn, Tweddle will work with Taralye to provide parenting seminars to the parents of deaf children. Our organisations both care for the preschool age group and there are natural synergies between us.

Tweddle is developing close relations with the Western Hospital and discussions are underway with the Royal Women's Hospital with a view to greater cooperation in the year ahead. Options for referral of families from hospital, following a birth, where a clear need is identified, are being explored. The Tweddle Day Stay program offered at Williamstown Hospital was also expanded from two to three days per week.

We are very proud of our involvement with local government. We work closely with the City of Maribyrnong and particularly the Maribyrnong 'Best Start' initiative. This program, involves a range of partners and is dedicated to improving service linkages to support families and children in the early years. We have also developed a partnership with the Shire of Melton to provide customised parenting education programs and specialised home visiting services. Of all Victorian municipalities, Melton has one of the largest populations of young children.



During the year, Tweddle chaired a parenting resource development project that was undertaken by a National Consortium. The project, funded by the Commonwealth, has developed a framework for parenting professionals to work collaboratively with clients. The Framework was finalised and the Federal Government has adopted it enthusiastically. We are now developing the framework as an interactive CD for dissemination to early parenting centres nationally and to other parenting professionals. This has attracted further funding from the Federal Government.

Over the last year, management was focused on reducing the deficit on one hand and rebuilding and developing the service on the other. The financial result for the year is a deficit of \$261,091, of which depreciation, unfunded by the Department., accounts for \$138,543. Contributing factors that led to the deficit are:

- An increase in depreciation costs due to asset revaluation
- All leave liabilities being brought to account including long service leave provisions and recognition of prior service.
- An anticipated loss in the parenting seminars program. This program is being reviewed with a view to it being cost neutral in 12 months
- Costs associated with organisational change, and
- The costs of developing a range of communications materials.

A number of specific changes were made to manage the deficit over the longer term. Residential services are now provided 12 days out of 14. This means Tweddle closes its service every other weekend.

A number of business processes and systems have been reviewed and made more efficient. Management structures have been flattened to promote a team approach, accessible decisionmaking, improved efficiency and cost reduction. As a result the forecast for next year will see a reduction in the deficit. In addition to identifying cost efficiencies other measures to raise revenue will be pursued.

The year had more than its share of challenges. We can be proud of the way we emerged with a reinvigorated service. We did this because of outstanding staff. As a CEO, it is a privilege to have such a dedicated and capable group of staff who, day-in and day-out, give service of the highest quality. To all staff: thank you.

Case Study 01

Samira came to Tweddle because she wanted to stop breast-feeding during the nighttime hours.



Parenting Services



A noticeable trend has been the number of support persons accompanying parents for admission. Generally, it is grandmothers accompanying daughters. In many cases it is these same grandmothers whose role it is to take over as daytime carer when the mother returns to work.

Tweddle welcomes this trend. Grandparents are a very important support group and encourage attendance at parenting programs.

Everyone at Tweddle understands that play is an important part of a child's learning experience. The early childhood team has focused on developing play experiences.



January 2004 saw the opening of a new outside play space. It provides a wonderful opportunity for children to explore, play in the sandpit, touch the plants, ride their bikes or just expend excess energy. Staff members from the early childhood team, work with parents in planning and discussing ways of helping children gain positive experiences from play. And they also explore how parents too can develop their relationships with children through play.

With casual nursing staff such an important part of the clinical team, a key project this year has been the establishment of an orientation program for these staff. The aim has been to enable bank staff to become familiar with Tweddle practices in the shortest possible time.

The theme in professional development for the year was supporting staff to work with challenging families. Staff members were involved in piloting the Parent Skills Development Tool. The framework principles and processes of engagement and collaboration will be a core focus for professional development in the next 12 months.

Our intake systems are under review. The skill mix of the team has been broadened and the triage process reviewed to better match client needs to service type.

Case Study 02

PETER + CHANTE

Peter had part time custody of his 22-month old daughter, Chantel.

Managing a toddler was tough for Peter. He felt he had little confidence. Chantel was very good at using the word 'no'! The intake team at Tweddle planned a weekend admission to suit Peter's work commitments. At the end of his stay Peter believed that his confidence had improved. He had an increased understanding of how to manage his daughter and he understood that the word 'no' for a toddler, is a very common word!

Community Programs



What a difference a day can make! Victorians can take part in Tweddle services across the state. The Day Stay programs in particular have widespread community recognition and are integral to our service model. They are designed to provide families with additional support to enhance the experience of parenting. The programs are also tailored to respond to the needs of working families.

Tweddle provides early parenting Day Stay programs in six municipalities around the State.

Corangamite: In the south west of the State, Tweddle provides a service one day per week in the town of Terang in partnership with the Terang and Mortlake Health Service. It is designed for families who are experiencing difficulties with children up to three years of age.

Hobsons Bay: In Williamstown, Tweddle provides a service in collaboration with The Williamstown Hospital. The service is available three days per week for families who are experiencing difficulties with children up to 12 months of age.

Hume: Tweddle provides a service in Tullamarine one day per week which is funded by Hume City Council in close collaboration with the Maternal and Child Health Service for families who are <u>experiencing</u> difficulties with children up to 18 months of age.

Maribyrnong: The service is available two weekdays and alternate Saturdays for families who are experiencing parenting difficulties with children up to three years of age. **Melton:** Tweddle provides a one-day per week service in collaboration with Djerriwarrh Health Service. This service caters for families with babies up to 12 months of age.

Wyndham: This service is offered in Werribee and is available one day per week for families who are experiencing any sort of difficulties with babies up to 12 months of age.

With positive word-of-mouth continually spreading and with a constant supply of self-referrals, all Day Stay Programs have completed another successful year. The programs run from 9 am to 4 pm with sleep and mealtime issues being the main concerns of parents.

In 2003-2004

- All programs continue to be well attended and in high demand
- Maternal and Child Health nurses are the major referral service for day stay clients
- A new contract was signed for the Tullamarine Day Stay Program to continue at least until June 2006.
- Demand continues to be high for the Hume City Council program.
- The Williamstown Day Stay Program, now in its fifth year, continued uninterrupted, and, at year end, was expanded by 50% from operating two days per week to three.
- Bayside City Council and Tweddle will commence a new model of service in a Day Stay Program in that area. The program will be piloted for a sixmonth period and will commence before the end of 2004.

During 2003/04 there has overall been an increase in the total number of families who have attended Day Stay Programs within the community.

The Home Visiting program, operating within a radius of 15 kilometres of Tweddle, continues to be in demand. It is used where parents have a transport difficulty, disability, cultural reason for not attending a group or where parents have twins and it is just too difficult to get to Tweddle.

The Home Visiting service operates from Footscray two days per week. Families may receive up to four visits over a four-six week period.

Home Visiting is designed to support parents in whatever they need help in – including managing a toddler, sleeping issues, meal time issues or establishing an age-appropriate pattern.



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Case Study 03

MARIA + JAMES

With her 10 month old baby, James, Maria left Western Australia and moved to Melbourne. Initially moving in with her mother for added support.

Baby James was continually having disrupted nights and would only settle if Maria took him into her bed. Maria's grandmother became anxious about the baby's sleep pattern.

When Maria came to Tweddle, she realised that she was not ready to have James sleep in a separate room. Because of the disruption of the move, it was important that he be close to her.

At the same time, Maria realised that she needed to give priority to finding her own accommodation.

The team supported Maria in making her decision and also put her in touch with housing support agencies.

Parenting Assessment and Skill Development Service



This Service is offered by Tweddle and is funded by the Department of Human Services (DHS) High-risk Infant Initiative. The program seeks to enhance parenting of children determined as "at risk" and referred by DHS to ensure their safety and best interests.

Tweddle provides DHS with independent, objective assessments of a range of parenting competencies. These assessments identify parenting strengths and needs to ensure that children have an opportunity to develop in a safe and nurturing environment.

Throughout the year, families participate in residential and home visiting programs. In the majority of cases, gains for the families were readily identifiable and they were able to continue on a path of developing as parents.

A measure of success for our staff is the development of trust with clients. We are very proud of the number of PASDS clients who voluntarily seek out Tweddle services to further parenting skills following a positive PASDS program experience.

During the current year staff have actively participated in a review of the Parenting Assessment and Skills Development service. There is clear acknowledgement of the complexity of the parenting challenges that the program confronts.

A number of changes have emerged from the review including an increase in the time allocated to program co-ordination.

An intensive 10 day residential program has continued with high demands for service – sometimes exceeding the capacity to deliver. During the 2003-2004 year a total of 46 families participated in the PASDS residential program with referrals from seven DHS regions.

Parenting Seminars

Education for parents is an integral component of all Tweddle programs. In acknowledging the need for high quality early parenting information, the Parenting Seminar team offers a variety of innovative and responsive educational opportunities. These are outlined in the annual Parenting Seminars Calendar made available to families through maternal and child health centres, libraries, community health centres or through Tweddle Footscray.

Highlights of the year included:

- Continued interest and enthusiasm from child care centres within the community for Tweddle educators to facilitate parenting seminars
- Commencement of a four week parenting course - Parenting with Confidence
- "Living and Learning" parent education workshops with Anglicare
- Recruitment of a new Parenting Education Co-ordinator to further develop the program
- Facilitation of a training day for Women and Children's Service staff, and
- The increased demand for specialist parenting skills development seminars for professionals.

Tweddle continues to offer an extensive range of customised programs on request for health professionals wanting to develop their skills or knowledge in the whole area of child and family health.

During the year a decision was made not to promote the professional seminar program that

had been running for some years. Tweddle will continue to offer tailored programs for health professionals on a customised basis. The emphasis of our education outreach is now more focused on delivering an outstanding and diverse program for parents.

Tweddle also provided a variety of early parenting programs for both men and women in Corrective Services in Victoria. These programs assist participants in further developing positive parent child relationships.

Training day with DAS WEST

Early in 2004 DAS West (drug and alcohol services for the west) contracted Tweddle to conduct a training day for DAS West staff which included staff from the D.A.I.S.I (drug and alcohol intensive support for infants) program.

Sessions were designed to give attendees a variety of strategies to assist in their work with infants. Topics included communication, stress and anger management for parents, plus sleep and infant development.

All participants and educators rated it a huge success. Delivery of this kind of specialist parenting program for professionals is very much a core part of Tweddle services.

Research Collaborations







Research and evaluation is critical to quality service delivery in the early parenting sector.

We continuously evaluate service effectiveness through client surveys at discharge and some eight to twelve weeks following discharge from a program. In addition, we undertake research to improve our knowledge and to improve support programs for children and families. Tweddle has established a number of research collaborations with research institutes to design and undertake targeted research projects.


Following initial research into the effectiveness of residential programs at Tweddle, undertaken in partnership with the Key Centre for Women's Health in Society, submissions have been made to funding bodies both in Australia and overseas to undertake broader research.

Collaborative research has also been carried out with the School of Population Health, at The University of Melbourne. This research examined the impact of a brief admission to Tweddle on maternal mood and infant behaviour.

This research found that for women with moderately severe psychological distress after childbirth, a Tweddle residential program appears to lead to significant improvements in maternal mood, confidence and to relationships with partners.

A collaboration with the Royal Children's Hospital Centre of Community Child Health has also been established to research current client needs and service demands.

Corporate Report

Tweddle received donations fotalling \$40,818 for the year. We are very grateful to all donors and thank each and every one for their generosity. The appointment of a Finance Manager in June 2003, was a turning point in financial management efficiency at Tweddle. Key developments this year have been:

- Upgrading systems
- · Formalising and improving reporting, and
- Completion of organisation-wide unit costing.

Financial processes are now very robust and responsive to business needs. They are geared to meet the financial and audit requirements of a public hospital and community sector agency.

Due to a very generous donation from Microsoft of approximately \$15,000 worth of software, Windows 2003 and the latest version of Microsoft Office, are now installed. Heartfelt thanks to Microsoft without whom the upgrade would not have been possible.

Financial processes are now very robust, strongly business focused and responsive to business needs.

A new Tweddle "brand" was developed, signalling a fresh approach in service and in communications. As part of this program we launched a newsletter, the first edition of which was distributed in June. The newsletter will be published twice a year to keep our parents and supporters up to date with early childhood research, programs and news of events.

The use of our physical space was enhanced with the modest refurbishment of the former Matron's Cottage for consulting space. This space is currently being used by Taralye – the oral language program for deaf children and also provides consulting rooms for our new psychology service.

Community project creates new playroom

A number of generous local businesses and services worked with us to redecorate our playroom for toddlers and babies. This initiative was made possible through a project coordinated by Christina Gouliotis, as part of her leadership course with the Landmark Organisation.

Christina developed a space that is colourful and cheerful, which stimulates and encourages children to learn and explore, and then learn and explore some more.

Improving all the Time

The effectiveness and quality of our programs ensured our success in late 2003 at the Periodic Survey conducted by the Australian Council on Healthcare Standards (ACHS).

An organisation wide risk management program funded by the Victorian Managed Insurance Authority (VMIA), enabled Tweddle to identify and address risks. Occupational Health and Safety and Infection Control programs were incorporated under a continuous risk management program. VMIA conducted a site risk survey and found Tweddle to be in the top 5% of safe organisations in Victoria. We are grateful for VMIA support in developing a risk management framework for community health.

Tweddle significantly improved facilities with the upgrade to the playground in 2004. The design of the playground included safety features for child njury prevention.

Client perception of the quality of Tweddle ervices remain very high as illustrated in the ccompanying graphs. 'The program was terrific. Declarations and Compliance Reports





Incorporation

Tweddle Child and Family Health Service is a Schedule 1 public hospital incorporated under the *Health Services Act* 1988.

Freedom of Information

No requests have been received in the reporting period for information under the *Freedom of Information Act* 1982.

Building and Maintenance Compliance

The building and infrastructure have been maintained at an appropriate level. A fire safety audit has been undertaken as required.

Equal Opportunity and Workforce

The Tweddle recruitment policy values and seeks diversity. Merit principles apply to all recruitment processes and clear polices are in place to ensure appointments on merit. Most staff in the Tweddle workforce are women. During the year four people left Tweddle and the total permanent staff at 30 June 2004 was 42.

Occupational Health and Safety

Through the year under review, there was a continuing focus on integrating Occupational Health and Safety issues into the everyday work and practices of all employees. It is pleasing that there were no injuries reported nor any Work Cover claims for the financial year 2003/2004.

Other important points to report are:

- The OH&S manual was reviewed and updated with the inclusion of an OH&S issues resolution process to assist staff to manage OH&S issues in a timely and appropriate manner
- The influenza vaccine was again offered to all staff, with a high percentage of staff choosing to receive this valuable opportunity to protect themselves and others in the community from influenza
- The inclusion of a risk management approach to our services and formal mechanisms to manage risk that incorporate occupational health and safety established.

There was a visit to Tweddle by Work Safe inspectors in January 2004. An 'Improvement Notice' was issued in relation to safety during building works. The Improvement Notice was complied with promptly. The inspectors provided some valuable direction about general management of OH&S issues at Tweddle.

VALE

MRS WINIFRED MARY KATE STEPHENS 14 MARCH 1907 – 17 JULY 2003

As a Life Governor for many years, Winifred Stephens was a great friend to Tweddle

In many ways Winifred was ahead of her time. It was back in the 1960s that she had great empathy with working women, understood the pressures of women who were running a household and a family, as well as going out to full time work. Winifred actively supported women balancing home and work responsibilities at a time when there were little if any formal supports for working women.

Her love of children and her respect for the importance of the family, led Winifred to work tirelessly for the Royal Children's Hospital, the Berry Street Children's Home, the Queen Elizabeth Centre and Tweddle. In addition, she worked to improve the pay and conditions of nurses.

In 1997, she was awarded the Queen's Jubilee Medal for her life of public service and contributior to welfare services.

Winifred Stephens was active even in her nineties and died peacefully in her 96th year.

We pass our sincere condolences to Mrs Stephens family for their loss.

We also pass our sympathies to the families of Mrs Phil Harbeck, Ms Thelma Mounsey and Miss Ellen O'Connell, life governors of Tweddle, who passed away. Case Study 04 MICHELLE + CONOR

Dur six month old son, Conor, was not a sleeper. My partner, Vlichelle, was exhausted. Our baby usually slept no more than one or two hours. Often it would ake us two hours to settle him.

We tried what we understood to be 'controlled crying' but we didn't have the confidence to keep it going. Every night our sleep was very disrupted. We were snapping at each other. Overtiredness really puts pressure on day-to-day relations.

Then Michelle took the baby to Tweddle.The change was amazing. Despite the joy that Conor gave us, before Tweddle, much of the time it was a struggle

Immediately after our Day-Stay program, Conor began to sleep like never before. Sleeping soundly for four-hours at a time was something we had not experienced. Suddenly he was ess cranky during his waking nours, more smiley – a different boy. And as for Michelle! She enjoyed her first night's uninterrupted sleep for six months. She had more energy to enjoy life as a happy, new mum.

The most surprising aspect of this changed behaviour was that both of us felt that we did not do the practical things very differently. The biggest change was our change of attitude. We no longer felt guilty when Conor was crying. Our visit was a turning point for our household.
